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Background, etc. on Cho.



Kimball Cho is Lisbon's second in command. He's the one she relies on the most, and it seems that they've worked together for a while.

He does most of the interviews/interrogations and with good reason—he keeps his head, even when the interviewees insult him.

His main feature, the one fans talk about, is his deadpan delivery. He never seems to get upset and always has a snappy comeback, especially when someone's being an ass. Other than a few times when a suspect gets away and he's angry at himself for the slip, he remains calm and cool.

Another thing about Cho is that he seems to have no interest in women. I'm not sure what it means (unlucky in love, just focused on the job at hand?). Even when Rigsby tries to set him up with a woman, he shows zero interest and just ignores him.



One thing that is an odd bit of fanon is that Cho never smiles. That's so not true. He doesn't laugh much, but even in the pilot, we see him grin a couple times, mostly in response to something Jane did. The other episodes debunk that idea—Cho has a great sense of humor, if a little dry.

His closest working relationships are with Lisbon and Jane, although he spends a lot of time with Rigsby on stakeouts.

On the purely shallow side, he's hot and has great arms.


Cho: Not looking up from his book. "If you're thinking of trying that on, don't. It's not your


Rigsby: "What do you think about older women?"
